Show and Tell

*"Tell your children of it,
and let your children tell their children,
and their children another generation."
Joel 1:3*

In many Old Testament verses, like the one above, people are urged to show and tell the following generations, their children, and grandchildren about the deeds of the Lord. These Bible verses pinpoint the need of religious education for the faith to be continuing to be alive also in the future. As we know, faith cannot be passed as such from a person to another, but teaching the bible stories that tell about Jesus, faith and how God is present in the life of the people and the whole world, offers a child or youth a mindset that nothing else does in this world. Even if they decided later that they will choose another or no religion, they still have received a set of tools that make them capable of making such choice.

I have sometimes heard parents telling, that they will let their children choose their religion when they are old enough to make that decision. It may sound like a noble idea, but it is an upbringing that leaves them on the mercies of the most common idolatry in today's world that is made up of ideologies of materialism, consumerism, and money. These values are not neutral. Their curriculum is compelling, and our kids are exposed to it every day.

It would be beneficial for a growing child to learn about the different kind and opposing values, and the power of God.

Sunday school and Confirmation classes help children and youth to understand that there is more to the life than having all those cool things and that one's value as a human being is something else than what she or he is wearing, listening, possessing, etc.

The early childhood and confirmation education are the cornerstone of St. Ansgar's and any church's activities. In the long run, we cannot function as a church without them.

Last Church Council meeting: January 15, 2018

Highlights of issues discussed:

- Jordan Smith has written a report about St. Ansgar, which will be distributed to Council and the Call Committee (UPDATE: Council and the Call Committee received this report on January 29th)
- Treasurer's report: financial report for 2017 year-end was presented to council. This information was also included in the Annual Report
- Worship Committee:
 - Pancake Tuesday (Feb. 13) - will be hosted by St. Timothy's Anglican Church
 - No Ash Wednesday service at St. Ansgar. Service on the first Sunday of Lent will begin with the imposition of ashes
 - Bishop Price will be presiding at St. Ansgar's Palm Sunday service on March 25th
- Call Committee: Council agreed on a list of congregation members who will be asked to serve on the Call Committee
- Volunteer roles and rota schedule: Council discussed challenges in finding volunteers to fill necessary roles. Council discussed ways to try to assist those who have expressed interest in volunteering for various roles
- Kitchen Renovation Committee: Phillip Ryan and a designer will be consulted to provide guidance on what can be done to improve the church kitchen and estimate what the cost might be.

Who are you? Where did you come from? Tell us all about that place...

That was one of my homework assignments when I was in public school. I kind of remember the classroom I was in, so I think it was when I was in Grade 3. It was a writing project, as most assignment of this nature was. Being in a mixed culture neighbourhood, I guess the school felt that it was good for students to talk about their originating country, at least the country that their parents were born in.

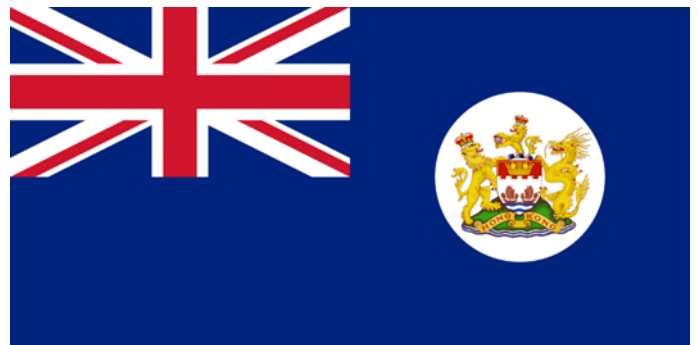
I was born in Hong Kong and so by definition, I am not even first generation Canadian. I am an Immigrant. Somehow, I was quite proud of this fact. I was quite happy to be different in this way. You wouldn't expect it from the city we are in today, but in my class back then, I do not recall any other Chinese person there. There were other Chinese people in the school, just not in my class and that made me unique.

One part of the assignment was to draw the flag of my home country. At that age, I already knew that Hong Kong was not part of China and that we are a British colony. That would mean the flag of Hong Kong is not the one for China, nor was it the Union Jack. I remember telling my teacher that I don't have a flag because Hong Kong is not an separate country that is fully independent.

The teacher helped me look up flags of the world, and low and behold, there it was...the flag of Hong Kong. Being a British colony, it had the Union Jack in the upper right corner, but it had a very nice coat-of-arms on it as well. Somehow seeing that flag made me want to stand up even taller because I come from such a special place that no one else in my class is from.

I tried to draw this flag. If Hong Kong was any sort of an iron fist dictatorship, I would probably be thrown in jail for the horrible attempt. Nonetheless, I proudly put up the flag – hanging down from the ceiling above my desk. Now everyone was able to see and know what country I came from and how unique it is.

I don't know why I was so proud of this as a kid. But I was able to continue to evangelize to others about Hong Kong and the fact that I was born there.



As the years went on, I did not stop telling others about Hong Kong. It is so common for people to ask where you are from, and I would proudly announce, "I am from Hong Kong". No doubts, no fears of reprisals, no worries that people would shun me. I just said it and I didn't care who knew.

Today, I am still proud that I was born in Hong Kong when I was. Times have changed, and the city has changed. I am not any less proud that I was born there...I am more saddened that the city has become the mess it is today, but that is a different story. If asked about where I am from, I will still proudly say "Hong Kong". That is one of the things I am passionate about and I am willing to evangelize to the world about it. And now you know about it too.

This charity assists many people in that area whose lives have been impacted by HIV or AIDS, and who are restricted by living in remote communities.

In 2005, Deborah McCracken-Nangereke made the life-altering decision to stay on in Mbeya, Tanzania after a volunteer expedition. Her time now is spent managing the charity's work there and introducing many successful programs into the rural communities surrounding Mbeya.

Deborah is also the head of the charity's Zion Home where she, her husband, and daughter live with 45 vulnerable children. The charity's Peace Home, headed by Home Base Care Co-ordinator Edina Chungu, houses 15 children who have been either infected or affected by HIV/AIDS. These children are provided with the excellent education and medical care until they complete their post-secondary studies or go on to other pursuits.

Today, the organization continues to support a diverse array of development projects including: the Montessori Program 2007, Community Health Outreach & Support 2009, Women's Small Business Groups 2010, Financial Autonomy Programs 2011, and more.

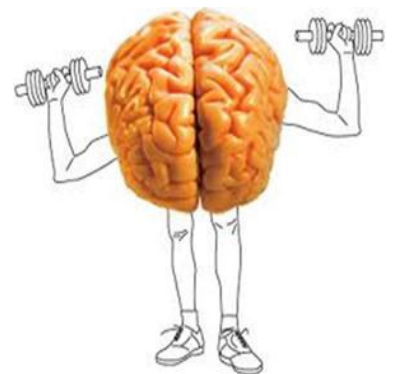
